Understanding the Continuous Improvement Procedure (CIP)

What is the CIP?

A flexible, and stepwise approach to Forest Management (FM) certification allowing initial certification based only on a subset of FM requirements and offering a clear path towards full conformity within a set timeframe.



Compliance

The CIP allows its users to progressively conform to FSC's requirements over the first 5-year certification cycle. The FSC Principles & Criteria (P&C) consist of 10 Principles and 72 Criteria, divided by the CIP into 40 Core Criteria (CC) and 32 Continuous Improvement Criteria (CIC).

Users can obtain FSC certification at the initial stage of the process by:

- conforming to the CC, and
- presenting an Action Plan that outlines when they will meet the CIC progressively within the first certification cycle, thereby maintaining their certification¹.

The CIP adds flexibility by classifying some criteria as low-risk, meaning that if a Management Unit (MU) is not active (i.e. no logging or sitedisturbing activities), compliance with these low-risk criteria is not required.

¹ After those 5 years, the users must be in conformity with all the requirements of the applicable standard and follow the regular process to keep the FSC certification.

Who can use the CIP?

Requirements for CIP users



Application: The SLIMF or CF manager² must request the use of the CIP when applying for FSC Forest Management certification through a Certification Body (CB). The CB will verify eligibility based on the SLIMF & CF eligibility criteria and approve the request.

²The eligibility criteria for SLIMF and CF are defined in FSC-STD-01-003 V2-0.

Initial Conformity Self-Check³: CIP users are recommended to conduct an initial self-assessment to check conformity with FSC standards. This voluntary step helps users better understand the requirements, prepare for certification, and may reduce audit costs.








Action Plan: is an Excel form⁴ that outlines the timeline for implementing FSC CIC criteria, over the 5-year certification cycle.

It must be submitted to the Certification Body at least 30 days before the main evaluation and is subject to approval.

Self-Monitoring: As part of the evaluation process, and to reduce evaluation frequencies, CIP users must conduct self-monitoring in year 1, 2 and 4 of the certification cycle. The monitoring report⁵ along with supporting evidence, must be sent to the CB on agreed dates.

Benefits of using the Continuous Improvement Procedure



Financial Flexibility: Users can spread their investment over 5 years while accessing the benefits of FSC certification from the start, potentially using those benefits to finance further conformance.



Empowered implementation: Enables users to take control of the certification process, with tools like the Conformity Self-Check for informative guidance and the Action Plan allowing them to chart their own path to full FSC conformance.



Cost-efficient and adapted evaluations: Culturally adapted evaluations ensure relevance to local contexts, and good performance may lead to reduced evaluation intensity and lower certification costs.





CIP integration into Group Certification Settings

The CIP can be used in both individual and group certification.

New group members who want to use the CIP must meet the <u>SLIMF</u> and <u>CF eligibility criteria</u>, meaning **groups can** have both **CIP and non-CIP members**. In such cases, the <u>Group Entity</u> must form subgroups accordingly $^{\delta}$.

Group members using the CIP can apply it for the **first five years** of their **membership**. **After** that period, they <u>must fully comply</u> with the <u>applicable standard</u> and follow the **regular certification** process to keep the FSC certification. The **Group Entity** will also have <u>additional responsibilities</u>, including drafting and overseeing the **Action Plan** and supervising its implementation, among others.

CIP members will **be evaluated** <u>based on their</u> **Action Plan**, which differs from the evaluation process for non-CIP members⁷.


Evaluation types and frequency for CIP users





The CIP introduces a flexible, risk-based evaluation process designed specifically for CIP users.

Initial steps of the Continuous Improvement Procedure



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Application in FSC system

The CIP users must comply with the requirements of the applicable FSC standard in their country or region, such as the Forest Stewardship Standards (FSS), Interim National Standards (INS), or Interim Regional Standards (IRS).

The procedure provides flexibility in 'when conformance <u>is required</u>' but does **not change the** requirements themselves.



The **evaluation process** for **CIP** users **rewards performance** by **reducing** the <u>frequency of evaluations</u>. Good performance **lowers the risk** of non-conformance, allowing for more flexibility, with **on-site audits not required every year.**

To obtain FSC certification, **CIP users** must **first** undergo a **main onsite evaluation**. However, **instead** of an <u>annual surveillance</u> <u>evaluation</u> leading up to the re-assessment in year 5, **only one** mandatory <u>on-site evaluation</u> is required in year 3.

If **performance** is strong, no evaluations will be conducted in **years**⁸ 1, 2, and 4. Instead, users must **submit** a <u>self-monitoring report</u> during these years.

⁸ If potential issues arise, the Certification Body may choose to conduct an **additional evaluation** in any of those years.
